AUDIT FINDINGS

<p>Narrative:</p> <p>The auditor’s description of the audit methodology should include a detailed description of the following processes during the pre-audit, on-site audit, and post-audit phases: documents and files reviewed, discussions and types of interviews conducted, number of days spent on-site, observations made during the site-review, and a detailed description of any follow-up work conducted during the post-audit phase. <p>The on site Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) compliance audit of the Community Corrections Center - Omaha was conducted on June 13th, 2016 by certified PREA Auditor Jon Groteluschen. Certified PREA Auditor Jen Foltz assisted with the on-site audit. Upon arrival a brief meeting was held with the Warden, Deputy Warden and PREA compliance Manager and NDCS PREA Coordinator and an overview of the audit visit process was shared. Policy and documentation relevant to PREA was provided for review prior to the site visit. A tour of the facility was conducted. Staff interviews were conducted with staff from all shifts and classifications. The auditor was provided with a roster of inmates and 16 randomly selected inmates were interviewed. The site visit portion of the audit was completed in one day. In the post visit portion of the audit all supplied documentation was reviewed as it pertained to each PREA Standard with consideration given to information gathered on the site visit to insure PREA standards are complied with in policy and practice. There were some minor issues discovered at the site visit that were corrected either on the day of the visit or in the interim between the visit and submission of the final report that are detailed within the relevant areas of the final report.</p>

Facility Characteristics:

The auditor's description of the audited facility should include details about the type of the facility, demographics and size of the inmate or resident population, numbers and type of staff positions, configuration and layout of the facility, numbers of housing units, description of housing units including any special housing units, a description of programs and services, including food service and recreation.

The Community Corrections Center in Omaha (CCC-O) was opened in 1985. The facility houses male and female inmates who are classified at community custody levels including both work detail and classification for community employment. Normally inmates who are near the discharge of their sentence or pending parole hearings are selected for placement in the CCC-O. The institution employs 34 full-time staff members that supervise or manage inmate programs. It was reported that 55 volunteers and/or contractors were authorized to enter the facility at the time of the audit. Substance abuse, educational and faith programming is available to inmates as well as referral to community programming. There are 2 male housing units and 1 female housing unit. Food service is provided. There appears to be adequate staffing and video monitoring. When budget allows there are plans to enhance quality and quantity of video capacity. There are areas where enhanced monitoring is needed have been properly identified. It was reported that the length of stay at the facility is 4.4 years however that appears to include inmates entire prison sentence. Clarification revealed information that the average stay in the community corrections portion of incarceration is slightly under 2 years.

There were 3 issues raised with the Statewide PREA Coordinator that were satisfactorily addressed in the interim between the site visit and the submission of the report as it pertains to CCC-O.

Volunteer Training (115.232) - records and policy indicates that contractors and volunteers are trained. Interview with the only available volunteer on the date of the audit showed a lack of understanding regarding basic elements of PREA. While this one interview can not justify that the training of volunteers and contractors is not happening balanced against policy and training records I raise the issue so the facility is aware that some concentration to assure adequate training.

Opposite Gender Announcement (115.215) - Inmate interviews demonstrated that in practice announcement when opposite gender staff were entering living unit areas of the facility was not happening. Staff were notified to start the practice as is outlined in policy following the audit visit.

Screening Tool (115.242) - Records indicate the screening tool is being used however there was a lack of recall in inmate interviews regarding the types of questions typically asked. I suggest that staff be reminded that the screening tool is not to be used as a review of the inmates record without them present and one function of the screening is to allow the inmates an opportunity to affirmatively declare their view of sexual orientation/gender identity and their thoughts to determine their classification in this area. I also suggest review of the tool to enhance the objective nature of the assessment tool.

The audit of the Community Corrections Center - Omaha found that 41 standards were met. No standards were not met. The facility was found to be clean and well maintained and staff was courteous and cooperative. The Statewide PREA Coordinator and Facility PREA Compliance Manager were extremely helpful to the auditing team. I commend the efforts of the staff at NDCS and CCC-O for their efforts in the area of PREA compliance.

<p>Auditor Discussion</p> <p>Elements of Standard 155.211 are clearly addressed in NDCS Policy 203.11. The Agency Wide PREA Coordinator reports to the NDCS Deputy Director of Institutions. Policy 203.11 establishes zero tolerance and outlines the agency's approach to prevention, detection and response. The PREA Coordinator was advised that she has sufficient time and authority to coordinate efforts to comply with PREA standards. The PREA facility compliance manager was interviewed and advised that she has sufficient time and authority to coordinate PREA compliance efforts at the facility level. Staff are trained in pre-service and in-service in PREA and staff interviews revealed good working knowledge of PREA principles.</p>

	The agency strategic plan was last updated in October 2015. Review of the agency master plan from 2014 including staffing information for CCCO shows an acceptable plan to promote safety in the facility. Video monitoring was satisfactory with a few areas that were known to administration where improvement is needed. Interviews revealed that when video monitoring technology is upgraded concerns for safety from sexual abuse/assault are taken into consideration.

	Cross gender strip searches and body cavity searches for female inmates are not conducted. Female inmates are not restricted from programming to adhere to the provisions of this standard. I note that CCC-O has the ability to utilize female staff from the nearby Omaha Correctional Center to ease issues of cross gender supervision. Policy does require opposite gender staff to announce their presence when entering the living area of the facility. Interviews with inmates indicate this is not regularly done at CCC-O. This has been corrected in the interim between the site visit and the submission of the report with an e-mail to staff clarifying policy that opposite gender staff will announce upon entry into a living area of the facility. Staff interviews indicate that searches only to determine gender are not allowed with transgender residents. There were no transgender residents available to interview at the time of the site visit.

	Policy mandates that inmates with disabilities and limited English proficiency are informed of and benefit from the facility efforts to enhance safety from sexual assault and sexual abuse. On a case by case bases the needs of disabled inmates will be met. Interpreters are available from the nearby Omaha Correctional Center and language line services are available.

Administrative investigations are conducted by agency investigators. Proper investigative protocols are utilized. SAFE/SANE services are provided by a local hospital. NDCS has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Nebraska Coalition to End Sexual and Domestic Violence (Coalition) for victim support services. No juveniles are housed at CCCO.

Website was reviewed to confirm elements or the standard are present regarding a statement that the policy of the agency is to investigate all PREA allegations and described that the Nebraska State Patrol assists in investigations.

	Policy mandates and interviews with investigative staff supports training and knowledge in techniques for interviewing sexual abuse victims, proper use of Miranda and Garrity warnings, sexual abuse evidence collection in confinement settings, and the criteria and evidence required to substantiate a case for administrative action or prosecution referral. Policy mandates and documentation was reviewed that investigators completed specialized training.

	Review of policy, interviews of medical staff and review of training documentation shows compliance with 115.235. SAFE/SANE services are provided by a local community hospital.

	Auditor Discussion
	Policy review, review of the screening instrument and interviews of screening staff indicates compliance with the standard. I noted with the PREA coordinator that there could be improvement in the level of objectivity of the instrument and while the current tool is sufficient an improvement is in development. Interviews with inmates indicated that there was little recall of the kinds of questions that are asked on the screening. Records were reviewed to insure that the assessments were being done. Additional staff training is warranted to be certain the assessment is being completed with the inmates and they are affirmatively asked to disclose their gender status if they choose.

	Policy mandates the elements of this standard. Interviews with staff supports that the use of the information from the screening tool is appropriate and properly disseminated. Policy supports the elements of the standard in regards to sexual orientation and gender identity of inmates. Interviews with staff revealed a positive staff culture in this area in their work with a recent transgender inmate.

	Auditor Discussion
	Policy provides and inmate and staff interviews indicated knowledge of multiple avenues to report sexual abuse and harassment incidents as well as retaliation including private reports and outside agency reports. Posters with reporting information were located throughout the facility and phone numbers were tested to outside agency where a report could remain confidential. Staff indicated that they were able to privately report incidents. An incident report of staff reporting an allegation regarding another staff was reviewed. Inmates are provided reporting options in material handed out at intake. It was apparent through inmate interviews that it is well know how to report.

	MOU is maintained with the Nebraska Coalition to End Sexual and Domestic Violence. A free telephone number is provided and the auditor did make contact with the agency through that number. Residents were aware how to report and utilize those services confidentially. MOU was reviewed, policy review supports the element of this standard and inmate interviews revealed an understanding of the service and how to contact it.

It is someone confusing when one considers one third of 2 facilities needed audited in the first year, however it is most likely the intent of that portion of the standard seems to suggest one of the facilities should have been audited in the second year of the cycle. The agency did get their facilities audited within the 3 year cycle which is a good accomplishment. I suggest exploring though the PRC to comply during the next cycle. All other aspects of the audit were in compliance.
